College Knights 'Go to Joseph'

Speakers at annual conference encourage young men to follow St. Joseph's example

College Knights looking for direction and guidance in life need look no further than St. Joseph, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly told hundreds of young men gathered virtually for the 56th Knights of Columbus College Councils Conference.

"As college Knights, St. Joseph can help you answer two key questions before you: What kind of a man do you want to be? And, more importantly: What is God calling you to do with the gifts he has given you?" the supreme knight said.

Knights of Columbus college councils, which are active on nearly 150 campuses in the United States and Canada, aim to help men contribute to Catholic life on campus through faith formation, service and brotherhood. This year's College Councils Conference, held Sept. 24-25, brought college-aged members together under the theme "Go to Joseph."

Supreme Knight Kelly stressed that St. Joseph can be both a powerful intercessor and a model of courage for young Knights making foundational decisions about their lives. He added that by joining the Knights of Columbus, they have already set out on the right course.

"As a college knight, you've already made a decision that sets you apart and sends a powerful message," Supreme Knight Kelly said. "Joining the Knights says to your campus and to the world: 'I am a man of faith and I'm not afraid to take a stand.' That's no small thing, especially now. You are following Christ at a difficult time and place."

Keynote speaker Father Donald Calloway, MIC, urged college Knights — in a world where there is "so much confusion about what it is to be a man" — to imitate the servant leadership of St. Joseph. Noting that many attendees will be called to fatherhood, Father Calloway encouraged them to look to Joseph under his title "Pillar of Families."

"If men are not there to shore things up, to hold things up, to be pillars, things are going to collapse," he said. "No, you have a role to play: servant leadership. You have to be sacrificial." Father Calloway, a member of Father Peter Paul Maher Council 6793 in Silver Spring, Md., challenged his brother Knights to foster and deepen personal devotion to St. Joseph. He suggested three ways to do so: first, honor St. Joseph every Wednesday, the day traditionally dedicated to him; second, pray the rosary and meditate on his silent witness; and third, consecrate oneself to him. At the conclusion of his address, Father Calloway then led the Knights in a prayer of consecration to St. Joseph.

After the supreme knight's message and keynote address, several councils were honored for their witness and service on campus throughout the last fraternal year. The Outstanding College Council Award, which recognizes the college council that best exemplifies the mission and ideals of the Order, was presented to St. John Henry Newman Council 11323 at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University in Blacksburg, Va.

Throughout the pandemic, the Knights at Virginia Tech provided opportunities for Catholic men on campus to gather at socially distanced events, including kickball games, cookouts and Bible studies. They also engaged in service projects, such as maintaining the grounds at the Catholic Campus Ministry's Newman House and raising money for local charitable organizations, including a local pregnancy resource center. (The Knights held a "tonsure drive," collecting more than \$5,000 for the organizations by shaving the tops of their heads.) One of the council's most visible witnesses to the faith was the eucharistic procession the Knights organized and held on campus.

A Message from the State Membership Director

Men Leaving the Catholic Church

Brothers.

State Membership Director

I hope this email finds you all well. About 11 million adult men in the U.S. were raised Catholic. Still, they left the faith, and men are underrepresented in the church versus their share of the total population (46% of parishioners are male versus 49% of the population. I read an article about why men leave the Catholic Church, and the following results will shock many of you.

- Men don't that Catholicism is unique and essential to a happy life.
- Only 38% of Catholic men strongly agree they are proud to be Catholic.
- Only 26% of Catholic men consider themselves to be practicing Catholics.
- A large majority of Catholic men, 57% are not certain it is possible to have a personal relationship with God.

Brothers, these numbers are not good for the future of the Catholic Church for several reasons:

- Fewer men reduce the pool for priestly and religious male vocations.
- Men are needed for healthy growing parishes; research shows that congregations with greater portions of men more are more likely to be growing.
- Men are much more influential in the conversion of their families than women. Research shows that when a woman converts to Catholicism, the whole family converts 17% of the time. When a man converts, 93% of the time, the entire family converts.

The Knights of Columbus have what men are looking for. Our Faith in Action has what men are looking for to help grow their faith. For example, Spiritual Reflection Program: Creating fraternal opportunities for prayer and reflection, such as retreats, produces spiritually vibrant councils.

Holy Hour: Eucharistic adoration deepens our relationship with Christ. Councils can organize their Holy Hours in various ways and incorporate things such as the sacrament of reconciliation and prayer for particular intentions.

Family Prayer Knight: Catholics often struggle to find opportunities to socialize and/or pray together with other faith-filled Catholic families. Family Prayer Night is an opportunity for council members, their families, and the whole parish community to come together for an evening of prayer and fellowship.

When recruiting, please remember to discuss the Faith In Action Programs with potential new members because many of them are looking to develop their faith but are not going to come out and verbalize it, so it is essential to find what them person wants.



facility. Their children, nephews and nieces are living so far away that their only means of communication is letter writing or perhaps a phone call.



The Council Historian will assist the State Historian in reaching into the respective Council archives for access to the significant events or activities of the Council and Brother Knights. In some Councils this role will reside with the Grand Knight, due to size of Council membership. Please be prepared to discuss who is best suited for this position in your Council. As always, this is your chance to tell and record your Council's continuing story!
- 2. In concert with Worthy State Deputy Joe Haun and myself, we recommend Councils setting up a "cloud based" storage system for each Council's records, photos, activity accounting, etc. The continuity of record keeping can then be documented/updated over the continuing "Columbian Year" by the Council Historian.
- 3. To accomplish the infill of Past State Deputy's Biographical information, from 2000 to the current Columbian year: I am continuing to work with resources from Supreme, PSD Ray Gardea and SK Kenneth Sawyer, State Communications Director to collect and archive this information. As mentioned before, we have received or will be shortly the Biographical information from all but one PSD from 2000 to present.

History of the Knights of Columbus More History of Bishop Patrick Manague

Patrick Manogue was born in Desart, County Kilkenny, Ireland on March 15, 1831. When he was three years old, both of his parents died within a few weeks of each other and the little thatched cottage in Kilkenny where the family lived was a sad place because there were seven orphaned children left behind. Michael Manogue, the eldest of the children, set off for America in the hope of improving the family situation and as he earned enough money, he sent it back to Ireland to bring his brothers and sisters to the New World, one by one. When it was Patrick's turn, he arrived in the United States in 1848 at the age of 17 and worked in

Connecticut for two years. He then moved to Chicago where he attended College of St. Mary of the Lake Seminary for three years studying for the priesthood. However, by the time the entire Manogue family arrived in the U.S., the need for money to support the family had grown more desperate. Patrick thought he could best support his family and realize his own plans to become a priest if he went to California to work in the gold mines.

In 1854, at the age of 22, he arrived in the California gold fields and went to work for three years at the small but prosperous mining camp known as Moore's Flat, about 20 miles from Nevada City on the trail leading north. This mining village, named after H. M. Moore, who owned and operated a hotel and had some mining interests, has a population of about 300 at the time of Manogue's arrival. When a priest arrived in the camp from time to time to minister to the miners, it gradually became known that Patrick had been in the seminary for three years and was working in the gold fields only to make enough money to help support his family in Connecticut and then to return to the seminary to complete his studies so he could be ordained a priest.

While at Moore's Flat, Patrick did quite well in digging for gold. He lived alone in a typical windowless miner's cabin located by a creek. He cooked over an open fire with the standard menu being boiled salt pork, jackrabbit, venison, and quail. However, the rigors of mining did not seem to deplete Mr. Manogue's strength at all. At 6'-4" and weighing 250 lbs., a fellow miner described him in these terms: "I never saw a harder worker. He was a young man of great frame and strength and worked tirelessly from morning to night. And yet he put in every spare moment studying."

Despite the uniqueness of his motivation for being in the gold fields and despite his recreational preference for study, Manogue's popularity with his colleagues is documented. He could be seen, the tallest man in the place, at the Miners' Union Hall, the Brewery or Piper's Opera House and his fellow miners always chose him to arbitrate conflicts between the miners. They accepted his verdicts with grace and said he prevented many fights among the men who stood in awe of his powerful Celtic physique and personality.

Remember: The message Blessed Michael McGivney continues to have for us, who carries on the work he began 139 years ago, when he gathered a group of Catholic men in the basement of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, CT.

"Knight in the Light"

Most Reverend Gregory William Gordon Auxiliary Bishop for the Diocese of Las Vegas, appointed May 28, 2021

Gregory Gordon was born on October 4, 1960, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He moved with his family to Boulder City, Nevada in 1972. He attended St. Joseph's University in Philadelphia from 1978 to 1980 and St. Charles Borromeo Seminary from 1980 to 1983. Gregory then received a Bachelor of Sacred Theology from the Pontifical Gregorian University in 1986 and a Licentiate of Sacred Theology from the Pontifical Lateran University in Rome in 1987.

Auxiliary Bishop Gordon was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Daniel F. Walsh on January 16, 1988, for the Diocese of Reno, Las Vegas. He was later incarnated into the Diocese of Las Vegas when it was split from the Diocese of Reno by Pope John Paul II on March 21, 1995.

His Excellency Gordon served as parochial vicar at St. Francis de Sales parish, Las Vegas from 1988 to 1990; associate pastor 1990 to 1991 and administrator 1991 to 1992 at St. Anne parish, Las Vegas; campus ministry at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas 1992 to 1993; pastor pro tempore at St. Mary of the Virgin parish, Las Vegas in 1993; associate pastor at Our Lady of Las Vegas parish from 1993 to 1994; administrator from 1994 to 1995 and pastor from 1995 to 2003 at St. Christopher parish, North Las Vegas; and pastor at St. Francis of Assisi parish, Henderson from 2004 to 2007. From 2007 to 2014, His Grace was assigned to the Apostolic Nunciature in Washington, D.C., serving as secretary to Apostolic Nuncio Archbishop Pietro Sambi and later, Archbishop Carlo Maria Vigano. On May 21, 2009, He was named a Chaplain of His Holiness by Pope Benedict XVI, which granted His Grace the title of Monsignor. He served as pastor at St. Anne parish, Las Vegas from 2014 to 2020. He was also named chancellor, moderator of the curia, and vicar general for the Diocese of Las Vegas in 2020.

On May 28, 2021, His Excellency was named an Auxiliary Bishop of Las Vegas and the titular bishop of Nova Petra by Pope Francis. He received his Episcopal consecration on July 16, 2021, from Bishop George Leo Thomas, with Bishops Joseph A. Pepe and Daniel F. Walsh, serving as consecrators.


