Worthy Grand Knights and Program Directors,

Do you have angels in your home?

Did you know that in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass during the Liturgy of the Eucharist, Heaven and Earth combine and angels join us in worshipping the Lord? Yes, it is true. Therefore, during COVID, I urge everyone to make the most of celebrating Mass virtually whether live-streamed or recorded. Sure, we have dispensation and are not necessarily obligated to attend, but why would you pass up the opportunity to have angels worshiping in your home with your family.

Celebrating Mass in your home is not a new concept. In fact, in the earliest days of the Church, Mass was always celebrated in homes, because churches as we know them now did not exist, and the early Christians faced persecution forcing them to often celebrate Mass in secrecy. There are probably some parallels to today with most of us being restricted from attending Mass in person due to government-enforced attendance rules, or having significant personal health/COVID concerns preventing Mass attendance. With these present scenarios, we should make the most of our opportunities in celebrating Mass in our homes.

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is the highest form of Worship. Worship being the operative word. We attend Mass to worship, not to "get something out of it." Obviously, we should get something out of it. In receiving the Eucharist, we obtain many sanctifying graces, assuming we are in the proper state of grace (not being aware of have any mortal sin). But that is not the only reason we are there. The Laity have a prominent role in worship, so we should approach Mass with worship in mind, and not just "watch" it on TV.

I operate on four basic principles when I get my family ready for Mass in our living room. I refer to these principles as the 4 Ps as they all start with the letter P. That makes for a convenient memory aid.

1. **P**reparation – Before Mass, clean the room of clutter, toys and other distractions. I place statues of the Blessed Virgin and St. Joseph on the appropriate sides of my TV, positioned like in church. We get to our seats (the couch) about 15 minutes prior to start to get settled and for some family prayer. This process establishes the right mood for celebrating Mass.

- 2. **P**resentation Simply put, this boils down to dress and appearance. We dress up for Mass even in our home. After all, this is about worshipping our Lord. If you approach it with this in mind, do you really think PJs and slippers are appropriate?
- 3. Participation Sing the hymns, you have no reason to be embarrassed in your home because no one can hear you except your family, God and the angels. Say the prayers and the appropriate responses as if you were actually at Mass, because you are. You should also be sure to make your offering or donation electronically. Churches are hurting financially during this crisis. And most importantly, be sure to make a Spiritual Communion prayer as you cannot receive the actual Eucharist in person.
- 4. **P**osture This is also an important part of the liturgy. Don't sit back in the recliner. Sit upright, stand and kneel during the appropriate segments. The church has specific reasons for each of these body positions. Look them up for an interesting research project.

So, when you take part in Mass on TV, remember these few hints and I promise you an enhanced in-home Mass experience. Remember you are there to worship, and when in the worship mindset for Mass, the heavens will open and you will have angels there celebrating along with you in your home. And as a bonus, when we all get back into our church buildings (which we must do to receive the actual Body and Blood of Jesus, as opposed to a Spiritual Communion only), those who take this approach will never again be critical of a priest's homily or difficult accent, or even a less-than-stellar music program at Mass.

ROBOTS A SCIENCE FICTION OR REALITY?

On May 5, 2020, Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) did a study on how robots can change our way of life. The study shows a 20% percent use of robot in manufacturing from 2015 led to 3.2% decline in industry wide

employment. Yet for firms adopting robot during this timespan, employee hours worked rose by 10.9% and wages rose modestly as well.

Interesting. Is this a mere (TAA) transition adjustment abnormality when the manufacturing process operations done by humans are replaced by robots? Those that remain are usually tech savvy workers managing the machines and are usually skilled and highly compensated. But what about the long term effect? As we learn more and start benefiting from replacing humans with robots especially in manufacturing, more and more operations will be replaced with more efficient robots which will increase productivity and eliminate work related injuries, errors and waste.

Much has been written about the rise of robots and the potential impact of automation on the economy. These extremes vary widely with some studies predicting that as many as 50% of all workers are at risk of losing their jobs to automation. As I vividly recall, this was the same concern we encountered in the 1960's. Computers became more widely used and started to make a significant impact in our old way of doing things. We slowly embarked in a paperless modality. The number of filing cabinets diminished if not removed completely in the office setting being replaced by desktop and/or laptop computers. We learned to use computers as a tool in obtaining data on a real time basis, instead of waiting for weeks or months. The effects on the workforce was minimal then. Computers made our jobs easier and communications faster. The transition was seamless in many cases. But this next stage will be very different because people are actually being replaced by robots instead of trained in the use of new technology.

Many say that It is time that some human jobs are replaced by robots. Many are becoming effective and accurate with the assistance of robot. Robots can increase output and production, keep labor cost down and improve reliability in manufacturing by removing errors. Material waste will be reduced to a minimum and production loss due to human errors will be eliminated. This will translate to higher productivity and lower cost of production and cost efficiency especially in manufacturing. Robots coming in different forms and sizes will become more intelligent as time goes on and its capability increase in geometric proportions as we learn more about the benefits of robotics and use of artificial intelligence. Soon robotic applications will be seen everywhere in the manufacturing, transportation, research, medical field, even replacing human parts. Then there is the driverless vehicles, trains, airplanes, and perhaps even replacing soldiers in times of war. It will unquestionably affect all areas of our human existence. Science Fiction or our future reality?



Evidence from US labor market published by the National Bureau of Economic Research validated the theory that each additional robot in the US economy reduces employment by 5.6% workers and every robot added to the workplace per 1000 human workers causes wages to drop by as much as 25% to 50%. So where do we go from here? How will people survive? Are we seeing the start of a human society dependent on government support? Is this where the rebirth of Socialism will occur or some variations thereof? Where the means of production and distribution falls in the hands of the Government and the survival of people depended on Government support? "From each according to his ability, to each according to his needs" - Karl Marks 1875. Where companies pays 50-85% taxes. On May 8, 2020 Various experiments were conducted on the application of (UBI) Universal Basic Income. in New Jersey, Iowa, North Carolina, Indiana, Seattle,

Denver and Manitoba. Former President Former President Nixon in fact even pushed to make it a Federal Law. So what is (UBI)? Universal Basic Income (UBI) Is a system that will provide everyone with a minimum living wage whether they are employed or not. It is intended to address job losses stemming from technological innovations. The advocates were visualizing a future society consisting of two groups of workers. Robots on one hand and humans on the other. As more robots takes more of human jobs, more people will be unemployed and enjoying more leisure time. Will this produce more income inequality and increase the gap between the rich and the poor?

This underlines the vast potential of robotics. Robotics and Artificial Intelligence is at a very early stage in its development. There is still much to be learned. We are just seeing the tip of the iceberg. There are certain industries that are far ahead in the use of the robotics and are now enjoying the benefits like the giga automotive factories that are churning out thousands of automobiles a day where it has taken humans months to produce. Amazon is using robots in its shipping, packaging and delivery business models. Now Walmart is partnering with Microsoft in warehousing, identifying consumer product preferences, and order fulfillment.

To replace humans with machines by automating manufacturing processes thereby reducing labor cost, waste and speed of operation. Machines are programmed to produce a certain number of output per machine hour. Machines do not tire. Humans do. Machines do not have a labor union. Don't get paid for overtime. Don't have health care benefits. They don't contribute to Social Security, medicare, no vacation pay, sick pay, and other paid leave of absences. They don't get pregnant and give birth to children which entitles humans to some paternity leave of absence sometimes with pay. They are always working even for 24/7 without pay.

The sigma lean process deals with the following:

- A) Focus on the Customer
- B) Identify and understand how the work its done (value stream)
- C) Manage, improve and smooth the process flow
- D) Remove non-value added steps and waste
- E) Manage by fact and reduce variations
- F) Involve and equip people on the process
- G) Undertake improvement activities in a systematic way.

Celebrate Father Michael J. McGivney's new "Blessed" status and pray for his Sainthood!!!

We do know; Blessed Michael McGivney, a model parish priest and founder of the Knights of Columbus, was recognized as a "saint" in his day by the people closest to him. When he was named "Blessed" by Pope Francis on October 31, 2020, the Church declared what many had long believed; the holy soul of Father McGivney lives today to intercede for us before the throne of God.

Over the years, thousands of favors have been attributed to Father McGivney's intercession, as Knights, their families and Catholics throughout the world pray to him in times of need. He is known especially for the favors related to employment and finances, reconciling family members, overcoming addiction, recovering from serious illness, as well as conversion and return to the Church. Coinciding with issues Father McGivney dealt with as a priest on earth, these favors show his ongoing care and concern for those who call upon him in faith.

In a spirit of total trust in God, we invoke Blessed Michael McGivney's intercession, for our own intentions and for the needs of others, knowing that one more miracle is required for canonization, sainthood in the Catholic Church. We pray, most of all, that through the holy witness for Father McGivney, man of the people, many will be brought closer to God and that we ourselves may renew our love of and relationship with God and neighbor.

"Knight in the Light"

Rev. John B. McShane

(Ministry of Serving the Homeless in Las Vegas)

Born in San Francisco in 1943, Father John grew up in a Catholic family. "My first memories of Catholic men involved in the ministry of the church was my father. Daily communicant when able, home visits with the St. Vincent de Paul Society, and in charge of the beverage booth at our annual Harvest Jubilee, as a member in the Father's Club. All of these activities were at the Star of the Sea Catholic Church in San Francisco."

Father John discerned as a student his interest in becoming a priest. "Being a priest has been in my thoughts since grammar school," he said. "After tasting the world, I still had the desire." He served in the U.S. Army Reserve from 1964 to 1970.

He earned a History degree from the University of San Francisco in 1967. Father John's focus was American History with emphasis on the role and status of Black's in the Military/Civil War. While at USF, mandatory curriculum was Theology and Philosophy which aided him later in his studies as a Seminarian. Father also opposed abortion and was interested in protecting the lives of the unborn. Which later became the "Pro-Life" movement.

In 1970, at 27, he left for seminary school in Columbus, Ohio. Four years later, a newly ordained priest in Reno, NV received his first assignment, from the Bishop, as a deacon in Hawthorne, NV. He briefly returned to Reno in 1974, where the Bishop of the Diocese assigned him to St. Teresa Of Avila in Carson City as assistant pastor. There he joined the Knights of Columbus and was the Chaplin for Sierras Madre Council 4781. Father John also led prayers at the State Senate and Assembly, and his parish members included Governor Mike O' Callaghan.

He returned to St. Thomas Aquinas Cathedral in 1977. "I love the history of Nevada," he said. "And it wasn't too far from San Francisco." In 1979 he was assigned to the Las Vegas Dioceses, where parish members came from all over the United States and the World. In 1982, he began his travels across the basins and ranges of Nevada, spending the next 14 years administering the faith in Tonopah, Virginia City, Fallon, and Laughlin until returning to Las Vegas in 1996.

Three years later he became the chaplain of the Catholic Charities of Southern Nevada, working with the poor, immigrants, refugees, and the elderly. "I was trying to help the people on the margins," he said.

Father John studied the practices of Mother Teresa, activist Dorothy Day and French writer and philosopher Simone Weil. In 1933, Day cofounded the Catholic Worker movement and newspaper in New York City, advocating direct aid to the poor and homeless.

By the time Father John arrived at Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Ely, NV in 2013, he had become well accustomed to the "Frontier Parish" spending more than 20 years as a Catholic priest across Nevada's rural interior. As he crisscrossed Nevada, he served Amargosa, Caliente, Fernley, Dyer, Round Mountain, Empire, Gabbs, McGill, Baker, Dayton, Beatty and for a while Lund and Currant. "I love the beauty of the area," he said. Father John was active with the Sacred Heart Council 1340 until 2019. "Throughout my priesthood, I have admired and benefited from the service that the Knights of Columbus provided."

In 2000, Father John founded the Las Vegas chapter of the St. Benedict Labre Homeless Ministry, named after the 18th century French mendicant, a worshiper committed to a life of poverty, pilgrimage, and prayer. The patron saint of the homeless, Labre spent more than a decade walking through continental Europe until his death in 1783.

Father John's every Monday ministry to the homeless is with the Holy Family Catholic Church, serving Las Vegas. He has received wide support from the Knights of Columbus both during and as he continues his ministry, "what else can I say, Knights are always at the ready," wherever Father John is.

"We have a good Pope," he said. "Pope Francis I is calling us to smell like our sheep."

November Family of the Month - SK Robin Pagni


