Annual CFL benefit tops \$860,000

OKARCHE – The Center of Family Love celebrated its 40th anniversary by raising more than \$860,000 during the organization's Gift of Love Virtual Celebration. The event was the eighth in CFL's history.

Generous donors from all over Oklahoma and throughout the United States participated at an unprecedented level during the event in support of the residents. Tanner, 25, one of CFL's newest residents, is a survivor of traumatic brain injury and multiple cancer diagnoses. He served as the event's first-ever resident host and emcee.

The Center of Family Love, which

was started by the Knights of Columbus in 1981, empowers individuals living with intellectual and physical disabilities to reach for and achieve their dreams while providing innovative lifetime care free of charge to them and their families in the event they cannot afford it.

The organization used the occasion to mark its 40th anniversary of serving Oklahomans with intellectual disabilities and held a birthday celebration for all of its residents, inspired by Pauline, CFL's first resident in 1981, who is now 40 years beyond her predicted life expectancy.

Additional highlights of the Gift of Love Virtual Celebration included a resident production of "Lion Sleeps Tonight" and a resident ballet performance in partnership with the Oklahoma City Ballet. CFL also pre-

sented its highest honors on two exceptional community leaders, with Richard "RJ" Schulte of Edmond receiving the Harold J. Wittrock Humanitarian Award and Jeanne Sullivan of Tulsa receiving the Carol and Bill Brown Community Ambassador Award.

Among the key contributors helping CFL to achieve this fundraising record included Kurt and Brooke Bollenbach, Ron and Nancy Carel, Knights of Columbus Charitable Fund, Knights of Columbus Our Lady of the Rosary Council #1287, Ovintiv, Republic National Distributing Company and Rep. Mike Sanders of Oklahoma.

Celebrating our faith at home also

My dear Brother Knights and family:

As this new fraternal year kicks off, and the new State Officers assume their duties, we focus as always on membership. The State Council has done so well in these preceding years with membership, even through and in spite of the pandemic. This year should be no different. The urgency to get things "back to normal," should be forefront on all of our minds, not just because it is the right thing to do, but because it helps in every aspect of whom we are as a people. Being

able to regroup in person and have face to face contact with our brothers is important in so many aspects of our Councils and our communities.

Just as "in person Mass" is coming back into fuller swing of things, it helps parishes come back together and parishes resume some sense of their normal life, so must the Councils.

That being said, we also have to be cognizant of the new variants of the virus rising in many places, even here in Oklahoma. We all hear and know of the statistics. I recently heard of terribly draconian measures the State of Israel was taking in these regards. It is virtually impossible to travel there. You might be able to get in, with negative results, but it might be very hard to get out, until you can prove you are negative for all variants — and you stay, at your expense, until you can prove healthy.

So, like good "Boy Scouts," we all need to be prepared: always prepared. That is where the Domestic Church programs come into

play and are vitally important. This is one of the best programs the Supreme Council can offer.

From the earliest days of the faith, the home — or domestic — church was the foundation of faith. The parish was a later invention. It was the home life where the faith was developed, fostered, nurtured and grew.

So doing the things we can as a family are vitally important. Praying as a family helps hold together the faith that has been instilled in us. The Rosary is one of the most important prayers the Church possesses. Pope Leo XIII once said, that "outside the Mass, the Rosary is the most powerful prayer the Church possesses." As we have seen across the face of the earth, during the pandemic, when the churches closed and the sacraments were closed off to the faithful, the Rosary was still available to the faithful to connect them to the faith-life of the Church, to the life of Christ.

Having a home altar is important as well. Establishing a sacred space — somewhere that is both convenient and somewhat private for the family to use. Someplace that is not too distractible to those using it (so not in front of the television, for example), but somewhere the whole family can gather if necessary, or just one member at a time. A space where there are elements that can be used by members of the family. It should not be too cluttered with items. It is not a "store" of religious goods, but some place that holds sacred items. If the family possesses a relic of a saint or blessed (many third class relics of Bl. Stanley Rother were
