Congratulations to <u>all</u> the winners and a big thank you/shout out to Council 1558, Former Master Ron Shymanski, Duane Spinler, State Coordinator Randy DeMars and all who made the State competition in Wisconsin Rapids a big success!

There's also been a small increase in participation in the Supreme Substance Abuse Poster and Citizenship Essay Contests, great. Now's the time to be wrapping up other programs such as Food for Families, RSVP, PKD, etc. Get your proceeds and reports in soon.

April is, of course, the big time for our ID Drives. I hope your plans are well laid out and will result in bigger donations at churches, stores, etc. than ever before for our "Tootsie Roll Drives." Be sure to enlist the help of family, parishioners, prospects, volunteers from organizations that assist the Intellectually Disabled as well as brother Knights in your drives! It's also a great time to donate toward and get your Council/parish involved in helping out Special Olympics!

As we move into the final quarter of our fraternal year, several major points of emphasis should be in our sight:

- 1) Star/Double Star Council Get those Church Drives, Admission Degrees, Benefits Nights or other work with your General Agents and Field Agents to bring in the new members and new insurance members you need to earn the Fr. hints at programs that can fill the bill. I'll be sending out that information to Grand Knights, Financial Secretaries and District Deputies in April also.

Remember that 4 of the programs you list need to be labeled/qualify as "Building the Domestic Church" programs. We'll also send out another list of the programs that qualify in that area. The information can also be found on the State and Supreme websites. Remember — every Council should be able to earn the Columbian Award!

3) Complete Council Award – The State Council's highest award for a Council, all Councils should be able to earn this one as well. We'll again be sending out checklists for this award to Grand Knights and Financial Secretaries as well as short report forms for District Deputies in April. Look these over in April and May with your District Deputy at your meetings. Figure out what you've already done, what yet needs to be done and get 'er done in April-early June! Be sure that you've sent in all your program report forms to State and Supreme as needed. I hope to see you all at the State Convention where you can check the Complete Council display boards so you can check your progress in areas we know of; see areas that yet need to be reported, completed, etc. I'll be happy to answer any questions you may have about this or any program! Also, check out the display at the Convention for ideas on new activities for 2017-18.

Plans are in the works to make adjustments in the requirements for Complete Council for 2017-18 and 2018-19 to make it the "Wisconsin State Outstanding Council Award," much more closely aligned with the Columbian Award. These will be announced at the summer DD/District Meet-



Wisconsin K of C State Charity Raffle

Congratulations to the Wisconsin KofC Raffle winners. The winners are posted on the state web site. The raffle was a great success bringing in approximately \$624,000.

The Charity committee did a great job at convention again this year and in the months leading up to the convention. Thank you to Ron and Marilynn Frosch (Green Bay Diocese), Dan and Joan Spencer (La Crosse Diocese), John and Linda Huttenhoff (Madison Diocese), Jim and Beth Ten Pas (Milwaukee Archdiocese), and Dennis and Doris Berends (Superior Diocese)!

Thanks also, to all of you who attended the convention and remembered to bring your tickets, checks, and the annual council request form. If you forgot your tickets, the money will need to be returned!

Below is the speech delivered at convention which gives you more details and examples of money provided by the Charity Fund: Thank you and pass on our thanks to your councils for selling raffle tickets to raise money for those people who had tragedies this last year and who were in needed our financial and spiritual help!

Preliminary numbers show that together Knights around the state sold 124,799 tickets. At \$5, we collected just under \$624,000! The preliminary % increase and decreases by Diocese are:

LaCrosse is down 1.9% Superior is up 4.1% Green Bay Diocese is up 4.8% Madison is up 7.3% Milwaukee is up 9.2%

After prize money and a few expenses, 65% of the money will be sent back to your councils for you to give out to worthy causes. The remaining money will be granted via requests that you send to the Charity Committee each month. We are giving out \$10,000 to \$20,000 per month to typically a dozen people requesting money, so this will translate to perhaps 150 families per year. Here are a few examples of the last 100 request, both large and small, from each diocese. Each one made a difference in their lives:

- 1. One woman in Lacrosse Diocese, age 43, spouse of KC member, had a brain aneurysm and cancer. Surgery was followed by staph infection. Council 4948 is contributing \$500 and a benefit breakfast Nov 6, 2016. The husband had cancer 2 years ago and they have children ages 5 and 7. Debt is due to inability to work and will be on long term disability. The fund provided \$2500.
- 2. In the Milwaukee Diocese this woman, age 24, lost all possessions in an uninsured apartment fire. She is a single mom of a 3 year old boy. Council 14478 provided some cash and the fund provided \$500 more.
- 3. In the Madison Diocese, this family have a 3 year old with a rare blood bacterial infection, Septicemia which caused the need for fingers and toes to be amputated, with risk to legs, but prognosis is good. The family has incurred \$23,000 in debt so far. Health insurance does not cover extended physical therapy or compression garments and bandages, travel costs to Iowa Children's hospital. Council 765 provided \$250. The fund provided \$1500.
- 4. In the Green Bay Diocese, this age 71 year old woman needed a wheel chair ramp which will cost \$1700. Council 2836 is providing \$200 and worked to get the cost down to this amount. The fund provided the remaining \$1500 to build it.
- 5. In the superior diocese a man, age 57, has substantial debts related to diabetes and multiple tendon quad repairs where he was off of work and incurred debt. He is former treasurer of council and GK. Uses walker, crutches and cane as needed. The GK of Council 2690 said he would work with the council to provide some money and the fund provided \$2000.

We want to see you give out all your returned money every year instead of hanging on to it. We want you to contribute to those causes you are filling out grant requests that are sent to the state council. We encourage you to organize benefits for those who have large debts that they will not be able to pay back. Please remember to get the new grant request from the state web site.

Your members will be inspired to work hard and dream up new ways to help people when they see your council donating to those who are truly in need!

PRO-LIFE THOUGHT QUESTION

"Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" 37 And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. 38 This is the great and first commandment. 39 And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. 40" (Matt: 22: 37-40)

This year when I presented the pro-life essay contest question to our middle school students, I asked them to reflect on this question: what difference would it make if we reversed the two great commandments found in Matthew 22. What if we make the first and greatest commandment "...love your neighbor as yourself" and the second greatest commandment "...love the Lord your God...".

It's a thought question, and unless parents gave some guidance, a bit beyond the comprehension of most seventh and eighth graders. However, some students got

it right. If we make love of neighbor the first and greatest commandment, then all sorts of evil can enter the world. "I feel so sorry for (name); she is pregnant and in school. Her life will be ruined. Let's help her get an abortion..." Or, this scenario. "Grandpa has severe Alzheimer's; he doesn't recognize anyone, and he is in so much pain. Let's ask the doctor 'to put grandpa down', just like we did our pet dog last year."

Do you see what happens? If love of neighbor is our priority, then it is possible to rationalize all sorts of moral evils that deny the intrinsic value of life. And this is what has happened in much of Western culture today. We "love" our neighbor too much to see him/her suffer, so let's solve the problem the easy way. As for "God", He's in second place, an after-thought for those who believe in such things.

The Barney Dunn award is presented to the Wisconsin field agent with the highest Supreme Lancer quota percentage of their assigned councils on "Lives" policies issued for the year.

This year's award winner is from the Northwest Wisconsin, Knolmayer Agency; James Regis Stachura. Jimmy achieved 135.62% of his Lancer Quota and 231.20% on All Business. This achievement encompassed 112 lives issued for Lancer and 175 lives for All Business. This is Jimmy's fifth time for the Barney Dunn award.

James Regis Stachura, FICF, started with the Knights of Columbus Agency in April 2006 when he was nineteen years old and joined the Order at eighteen years old. He is a 4th Degree member of Assembly 1525 and belongs to Council 1257 both in Eau Claire, WI.

Jimmy grew up in Pulaski, WI and is the youngest of ten children. His father, James J. Stachura, is a retired field agent, who dedicated his life's work for thirty-three years to protect members and their families through the Order. This same dedication has been passed on from father to son and is evident in Jimmy's dedication to the Mission of Venerable Fr. Michael J. McGivney. Jimmy and his father are unyielding in their efforts to recruit new members.

Moreover, Jimmy has achieved again in 2016 the Insurance Industry's Million Dollar Round Table designation with the distinctive designation of "Court of the Table." Furthermore, Jimmy was a second time Supreme Agency trip qualifier.

During the past eleven years, Jimmy has been serving members in the Northwest Wisconsin Agency jurisdiction. His favorite part of working for the Order is recruiting and helping clients with life insurance, retirement annuities, long term care and disability income needs.

Congratulations Jimmy for another outstanding year.



Our Lady of Guadalupe Silver Rose Run 2017

The Route 3 Silver Rose for Our Lady started on 5 March in Manitoba. The Silver Rose is passed on to Minnesota (9 April), then North Dakota (30 April), South Dakota (21 May), Iowa (18 June), Wisconsin (16 July), Illinois (13 August), Missouri (10 September), Arkansas (8 October), Texas (29 October) and Mexico (9 December). The Rose is presented to Our Lady at the Basilica in Monterrey on her feast day, 12 December. The current schedule and route through Wisconsin as of 3 May are shown below.

The Rose passes through Wisconsin with daily prayer services at host councils. The prayer services are not restricted to members of the host council. The purpose of the route is to give everyone in the State Knights, families, Catholics and non-Catholics, an opportunity to placing their prayers of thanksgiving and petition onto the Rose to be presented to her on her feast day.


