I would urge that a note should be included in the next State Newsletter, that those renting should acquire insurance which renters covers fire and personal liability. So many renters know this chose don't or ignore it. People need to take some responsibility for their financial well being"



Dear Brother Knights and Ladies,

I would like to thank our Worthy State Deputy, Tim Guski and Culture of Life Director Daniel Miller for giving me the opportunity to serve as your State Life Savers for Life Chairman.

My primary responsibility as Chairman will be to grow the Life Savers for Life Program. Last year we had 64 councils run this program. This represents about 22% of all councils in Wisconsin. Your efforts helped raise nearly \$25,000 which is distributed to the Respect Life organizations of your choosing in every part of the state. Some that were supported through this program are "Life Connection, Care Net, Women's Care Center, Women's Support Center and there are many more. We would love to see all the councils run this program, but the goal for 2017-2018 is to get 70+ councils to support this program. I know we can do it.

This is an easy to run fundraiser. The program is patterned after the very successful "Tootsie Roll" fund raiser with its own wraps that can be used on the same canisters. Lifesavers were offered to councils in partial case counts- which helped many councils participate for the first time. The order forms for Life Savers for Life can be found on the state web-site. The Program Report form has been revised and we hope it's a LITTLE easier

to use. Grand Knights and District Deputies, the Life Savers for Life order form is due by August 1, 2017. The Life Savers for Life Master Order Form is due by August 15, 2017. Questions? Call Roland Ransom 262-441-1306.

At the recent state convention we were told that Order Wide there are 750 ultrasound units in place. In Wisconsin we will soon have "26" purchased and delivered in Wisconsin. Wisconsin is a leader in this program. We are saving Life's.

As Dan Miller said, creating a "Culture of Life" in Wisconsin is an ongoing mission.

Thank you to all 64 councils who participated in this program. I know this year will even be more successful.





# Our Lady of Guadalupe Silver Rose Run 2017

The Route 3 Silver Rose for Our Lady started on 5 March in Manitoba. The Silver Rose is passed on to Minnesota (9 April), then North Dakota (30 April), South Dakota (21 May), Iowa (18 June), Wisconsin (16 July), Illinois (13 August), Missouri (10 September), Arkansas (8 October), Texas (29 October) and Mexico (9 December). The Rose is presented to Our Lady at the Basilica in Monterrey on her feast day, 12 December. The current schedule and route through Wisconsin as of 3 May are shown below.

The Rose passes through Wisconsin with daily prayer services at host councils. The prayer services are not restricted to members of the host council. The purpose of the route is to give everyone in the State Knights, families, Catholics and non-Catholics, an opportunity to placing their prayers of thanksgiving and petition onto the Rose to be presented to her on her feast day.

Every council in the State should make an effort to inform councils and parishes of the Silver Rose passing through their area. Sample poster and bulletin are available either from the host council or from the State Coordinator.

The following is an excerpt from Supremes' webpage that describes the background of the Special Olympics program.

"Since 1968, the Knights of Columbus has raised and donated more than \$600 million to programs for people with intellectual and physical disabilities - Special Olympics ranks among the larger gifts the Order makes annually of time and money.

In 2005, the Knights of Columbus announced a partnership with Special Olympics; committing \$1 million over four years to grow the program in North America in addition to pledging increased volunteer support for state and local games. The Order also pledged to work with Special Olympics North America to expand its program to underserved countries. The Knights of Columbus has subsequently extended that commitment through 2016.

The Knights of Columbus commitment to Special Olympics and to hundreds of grassroots programs for people with intellectual and physical disabilities is an expression of our belief in the intrinsic worth of every human being.

In April 2005, the Order gave its highest honor, the

Gaudium et Spes Award, to Jean Vanier, the founder of l'Arche, a network of faith-based communities that care for people with developmental disabilities in a community setting.

Jean Vanier founded the first l'Arche community in Toronto in 1969, and today there are 29 communities throughout Canada, serving more than 500 people with disabilities. It has also expanded around the world, and there are now more than 146 l'Arche communities in 35 countries on six continents, with over 5,000 members. Vanier exemplifies the call to self-giving and Christ-centered community involvement that is a central theme in Gaudium et Spes, and his life and dedication are an inspiration to all.

The Knights of Columbus believe that the Special Olympics are nearly unparalleled in their ability to show the intrinsic worth and dignity of every single human being. These games don't just build strength and character in the athletes and participants; it only takes a few moments with the competitors to be inspired by the force of their determination, and the true sense of God's

They are second graders and younger, climbing on jungle gyms, playing with dolls and Legos, preparing for their first Communions or just learning to crawl, walk or talk.

These 8,372 young lives – age 7 and younger – are alive today because of Women's Care Center and the ultrasound machine donated to them by the Knights of Columbus in June 2010.

It's a reality that not only amazes Sharon Hudy, executive director of the Women's Care Center of Milwaukee, but one that makes her determined to continue the center's mission



of offering real choices for pregnant women and their babies.

"Not in my wildest dreams did I ever think that I would be part of an organization with the capacity to save so many lives," said Hudy in an interview with Dan Miller, a member of Oconomowoc Council 2487 and state coordinator Wisconsin Knights of Columbus Culture of Life Committee. "The Knights of Columbus play a key role in the life-affirming mission of Women's Care Center and we are very grateful."

The Milwaukee outreach is a licensee of what Hudy describes as the largest and most successful Catholic-based pregnancy resource center in the United States.

Founded in 1984 by Dr. Janet E. Smith, a professor at the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, IN, the Women's Care Center boasts 25 centers in eight states, serving 25,000 women annually. All are located in the vicinity of abortion facilities and according to its website, womenscarecenterfoundation.org, more than 92 percent of women who receive counseling and an ultrasound choose (Continued on page 15)

life for their baby.

According to Hudy, there is one Knights of Columbus ultrasound machine in each of the 25 centers nationally. Nearly 150,000 babies throughout the United States have been saved from abortion through the work of Women's Care Center and their life-saving ultrasound program.

"Many times women feel that abortion is their only option, their only way out. Because of our physical location to abortion facilities, we are truly a 'boots on the ground' mission. This is where the most critical need is. This is ground zero," explained Hudy.

The Women's Care Center in Milwaukee merged with the Pregnancy Help Center in 2009, another local Catholic-based organization begun in 1984. In June 2010, the Women's Care Center opened its doors across the street from Wisconsin's busiest late-term abortion facility.

It opened with the ultrasound machine donated by the Knights of Columbus.

"We couldn't open without it (the machine)," explained Hudy. "It's a critical part of our life-saving model"

She recalled calling several members of the Knights of Columbus: Peter Schwabe, John Schroeder, Paul Smyczek and George Ploof, and after she explained the project, she said they got the ball rolling.

"It was amazing to watch the emails fly about as they challenged their brother Knights to help – and they all did," said Hudy. In a very short time, Councils 2487 – Oconomowoc and 7048 – Mukwonago raised \$12,000. Soon after, the groups received a matching gift through the Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative.

"That original ultrasound machine was traded in last year and upgraded to a 3D/4D model," she explained, "again thanks to the generosity of the Knights of Columbus."

Since the Milwaukee Women's Care Center has opened, abortions have decreased in the Milwaukee Archdiocese tencounty area by 37 percent, according to figures from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

"We were so overjoyed to see the fruits of our labor in the statewide statistics," she said, "We are making a huge impact – and we are growing, growing, growing."

Key to the program's success, she said, is the fact that not only does it offer women the opportunity to choose life for their babies. It also helps them to become self-supporting and create nurturing families.

"Women's Care Center embodies Catholic Social Teaching especially the Church's consistent ethic of life," said Hudy. "We are pro-woman, pro-child, and pro-family. We walk with moms (and dads) every step of the way through pregnancy, parenting, adoption preparation, and even post-abortive healing."

All of Women's Care Center's medical-grade services (pregnancy tests and ultrasounds) and programs (counseling, goal setting, and educational classes) are free and incentivized. Moms who maintain healthy pregnancies by keeping their pre-natal appointments and visit the centers for counseling and parenting classes earn all new baby supplies through their Crib Club program.

Explaining that the cost of helping one heavily abortion-minded woman is approximately \$1,000 in goods and services, Hudy said the Milwaukee center has set a goal this year of saving 1,000 babies for \$1 million.

"It takes 4-to-5 visits before a heavily abortion-minded woman finds the hope and help she needs to make a choice for

life," explains Hudy. "And when they do there are many more visits necessary for supporting them in their quest to become the parents God intended them to be."

The organization relies entirely on private funds and does not accept public money. "We want – and need - more Knights of Columbus councils to tour our centers, get to know us and financially support our Catholic-based better way approach," she said, suggesting that councils adopt the Women's Care Center as an ongoing benefactor.

Hudy's passion for her work with Women's Care Center is a "God-given gift", she said. She believes the center, which has hosted Eucharistic processions flanked by the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, Masses and Eucharistic adoration on the premises, came to be "because God intended it to be."

Milwaukee Archbishop Jerome E. Listecki, a fourth degree Knight, serves on its board of directors.

"The Holy Spirit is alive in all our centers," said Hudy. "We are the hearts and hands of Christ. We are blessed to serve arm-and-arm in this most holy mission with our Brother and Sister Knights of Columbus and plan to deepen that relationship for many years to come!"
