My Dear Brother Knights

The first relationship I will talk to you about in this message is our relationship with our Brother Knights. I urge you to take advantage of the opportunity to build on our Vocation to Fraternity by making the strengthening of your relationships with your Brother Knights a priority for your council. Our Brother Knights are all, through Jesus Christ, beloved sons of God our Father. Let us act accordingly.

Worthy Grand Knight, task your Council Retention Committee, headed up by your Deputy Grand Knight, to do all they can to make personal contact twice each year with every member of your council; once on their birthday and once on the anniversary of their exemplification into our order.

If personal contact cannot be established send a card. Send it with return requested so you can know if they are no longer at the address that you have on file. Your Financial Secretary has tools at his disposal for finding our "Lost Sheep," and training in the use of those tools has been, and will continue to be, made available to him. Let us together commit to finding our lost sheep and leading them back home into our Brotherhood.

The next relationship that absolutely must be protected and made as safe as we possibly can make it is our relationship with the children who we serve. Each and every one of us shares, with our Supreme Council, a sincere desire to protest from all harm the children who participate in our youth programs. This is why our Supreme Council has retained the services of the same company employed by the Boy Scouts of America to ensure a safe environment for the boys involved in their programs. Please be patient with the roll-out of this program throughout our order. There are bound to be some bumps in the road with an effort this massive, but if we keep our focus on the goal we can all get there together and we can leave a smoother road for those who follow us. Another relationship essential for a healthy, growing council is the relationship of your council with your council's home parish. Now, if your first reaction is one of wondering which parish is your council's home parish, there is some work to be done. If, when your parish priest asks a men's group for help with something, it is not your council that he is asking, there is some work to be done. And if the parishioners of your council's home parish do not see the Knights of Columbus as a key contributor to vibrant family life, well, we have a program for that called Building the Domestic Church.

My Brothers, make no mistake, our Knights of Columbus programs are excellent. And your council might do a great job with those programs. But if your council does not have a strong relationship with your home parish, that is a warning flag that is only ignored at your peril. (continued page 2)

ers, about God and Jesus. On Monday evening my wife and went to a wake, and I just happened to notice a man with a Tootsie Roll Pop in his mouth. I didn't think much about it until sometime later when I began to think about how a Tootsie Roll Pop was constructed. I realized that it was made up of three parts, the hard candy outside, the soft chocolate center, and the stem, that was stuck into the center. Then I began to think about how the sucker was much like people. A bag of Tootsie Roll Pops are of all different colors, and flavors, just like people. Our eyes, hair, and skin may be of different colors, but if that is taken away, we all have the same things, inside of us. Our blood is all red, we all have bones, our hearts all pump, and our bodies all run on electricity. We are all human! When a "Pop" is unwrapped and first placed into your mouth, it is very hard and rough, and is much like when we are first born, when life is rough and very hard. As you continue to lick and consume the "Pop" the edges begin to get smoother, just like life gets easier and smoother. The closer you get to Jesus the easier and smoother life gets. I then began to think again, about the three parts of a Tootsie Pop. The hard candy outside is like God, and covers everything, and is made up of all the flavors. The chocolate center is like Jesus, it should be the center of our life and it holds everything together. The white stem is like the Holy Spirit, it goes to the center of the sucker and our life. If you take a Dum Dum sucker you can never make a Tootsie Roll Pop out of them for there is no chocolate center. If you want to make your councils like a "Pop" make sure you include the Family programs into your agenda. Remember, Father McGivney started the Knights of because of families, and we should honor him by honoring our families by recognizing them with a nomination to the Family of the Month, and the Family of the Year program. I hope this analogy is a delightful tidbit for you, and that you may never look at a Tootsie Roll Pop the same again.



Time to get onboard with Recruitment Drives

It is after the Mid-year District Deputy meeting. Now we have your district meetings to go over what we have done, what we can do to improve, and what steps need to be done to achieve Star Council. These district meetings need to be attended by more than just the Grand Knight or the Financial Secretary. There is so much information than can be learned at these meetings and we need more people to be there to receive it. You can hear about new programs that are working and also you can share in areas that you have succeeded. Also when you go to district meeting, please be ready to tell the district deputies when you will hold a first degree for the next nine months. Please remember that we have asked all districts to have at least one first degree every month.

Our November in the state was a good month. We gained over 10% of the total yearly goal of members in November. If we keep this rate up, we could achieve over 100% of our goal for the state. I congratulate all who recruited in November and I hope you have found how easy it is to recruit and will continue to do so in the upcoming months. However if we look in past years, we always have done well in November, but fall off tremendously in December. I have looked into why we fall off from one month to the next and come to a conclusion that we do not have a drive scheduled or a state organized drive.

A state organized drive is something we are going to try to see if we can help our councils have better success in all months. So the State Membership team has introduced State recruitment drives every other month. January will be our first state recruitment drive month and we ask that you hold a recruitment drive to honor our council Chaplains. Also any first degrees done in January, please dedicate them to the Holy Name of Jesus. In March we have a Supreme Recruitment drive on March 14 -15 and dedicate the drive to Fr Michael J McGivney. Any first degree held in March, we ask them to be dedicated to St Joseph. Our last scheduled recruitment drive in May. We ask councils to dedicate May's drive to honor Bishops. Also to dedicate the first degrees in May to Mary our blessed mother.

I wish all of you great success and great rewards in this Christmas season and the upcoming months in recruitment. Please remember all catholic men should have to opportunity to become a Knight of Columbus. I do not know any of us that hinder any Catholic man to joy and the honor to become a Knight of Columbus. All we have to ask "are you interested in knowing more about the benefits of the Knights of Columbus".

Hope that your 2014 programming is wrapping up well and planning for your 2015 activities are ready to roll. Remember that every program is a mechanism to recruit parents, parishioners and prospects! Not only do we want to increase our ranks, we also have the goal to see a huge increase in the number of Councils attaining Star Council and earning the Columbian Award and Complete Council Award. Hence, your DDs will be working closely with you from January-May to reach those goals!

This year, with 2 separate Christmas Poster contests in operation, remember that all winners for grades 1-4 for the "True Meaning of Christmas" Poster Contest need to be to your Diocesan Program Coordinator by December 31. (In the Madison Diocese, send them as before to Richard Schwartz.) If you have done the Supreme "Keep Christ in Christmas" Poster Contest, those winners for ages 5-7, 8-10, 11-14 should come directly to me. Thanks!

Our featured Supreme program for this month, as we focus on "Peace on Earth, Good will to all," is the Global Wheelchair Mission. In 2003, the Knights of Columbus began participating in this mission, sponsoring 2000 wheelchairs to be distributed in Afghanistan. Since then, Knights in the U.S. and Canada have sponsored distribution of over 40,000 wheelchairs in 14 countries in the Americas, Europe, Asia, the Pacific and Caribbean areas! These gifts aid those who lack freedom of mobility. The Global Mission purchases the wheelchairs in bulk and delivers them by sea containers around the world. They're then distributed by numerous NGO's such as the Knights; Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions groups, etc. For every donation of \$150, the Mission can deliver a brand new wheelchair which would cost \$500 in a medical supply store! They're shipped by 100-280 chair containers directly from factory to destination countries at no cost to the recipients! Councils are encouraged to promote the program to their membership, invite personal donations; implement this as an ongoing charitable program. Conduct targeted fundraisers such as pancake breakfasts, pasta dinners, car washes, etc. with proceeds going to the Global Wheelchair Mission. Involve the entire parish; do monthly or quarterly collections after mass. Secure your pastor's support for announcements promoting the program. Get the entire community involved in working on/supporting the project!

If a Council purchases at least 1 case (100) chairs by raising funds through Council, parish and/or community activities, it'll qualify for the entire Community area for the Columbian Award! See the Supreme "Charitable Programs Plan for 2014-15" for more information!

On another note, remember that the State Knowledge and Free Throw Contests are set for Wisconsin Rapids Assumption High School on Saturday, March 28. Your Council, District and Diocesan Contests need to be completed before then. Be sure your green (Council-District/Diocese) and orange (Diocese-State) travel cards are completely and accurately filled out.

The Committee will be disbursing \$158,000 to several of the 70 groups who applied for State Funding. We will not be able to assist all of the groups who applied, as the total application amount came in over \$575,000. Any council is able to assist groups in their area to apply for state funding in future years. Applications are accepted during; September, October, and November, with application instructions on the Wisconsin State Council Forms Page.

In the Winter Packets are all of the paperwork to order Tootsie Rolls for the 2015 campaign. Please return the Council Order Form to your District Deputy as soon as possible, which will allow the District Deputy to get the District Order Form turned in on time. If your council is in need of aprons please order the aprons through Developmental Service Center. As soon as you have completed your drive, fill out the Council Disbursement Form and mail it in with a check as instructed on the form. All forms are on the Wisconsin State Council Forms Page.

Tootsie Roll weekends will be held around the Wisconsin from April 16 through May 3. Start to contact your local businesses and parish priests to see which weekend works best for your council.

Dear Brothers,

Building a Culture of Life requires time, effort, resources and prayer. As Knights of Columbus, we are called on for many things. Among the hustle and bustle of our daily lives, sometimes we put prayer at the bottom of the "To-Do-List." Don't do that! In this season of Advent as we prepare for the birth of our Lord, let us simply take some time to reflect and pray.

What road will that prayer lead us to? Hard to say – but unless we take the time to pray, we'll never find out! If you are not sure where to start, I have a suggestion! Providentially, our State Council has adopted the motto, "Go to St. Joseph." Abortion is a spiritual battle. Yes, we fight it in the temporal world, but it is essentially fought and won in the spiritual world. In the Litany of St. Joseph, he is referred to as the "terror of demons." Call on St. Joseph in this novena during Advent to end abortion, would you?

Oh, St. Joseph, whose protection is so great, so strong, so prompt before the throne of God. I place in you all my interests and desires. Oh, St. Joseph, do assist me by your powerful intercession, and obtain for me from your divine Son all spiritual blessings, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. So that, having engaged here below your heavenly power, I may offer my thanksgiving and homage to the most loving of Fathers.

Oh, St. Joseph, I never weary of contemplating you, and Jesus asleep in your arms; I dare not approach while He reposes near your heart. Press Him in my name and kiss His fine head for me and ask him to return the Kiss when I draw my dying breath. St. Joseph, Patron of departing souls - Pray for me.

This prayer saved my life on the mountaintops of Guatemala in 1996. My dad and I were driving a donated vehicle to a Catholic orphanage, the Farm of the Child, in Trujillo, Colon, Honduras. AFTER we had the brakes fixed in Guatemala City, we proceeded on our trip east. Mid-way down one of the mountains outside GC, I pushed down on the brake pedal to slow down our descent. There was no brake pressure! As I was white-knuckling the steering wheel, pumping the brakes furiously down that guard-rail-less, gravelly mountain road with my dad, he said, "Don't worry Daniel, I got this one! I'm praying the St. Joseph Prayer for us! It promises that we don't die in a ball of fire!" That was not the visual I was looking for at that exact moment! Miraculously, I found some pressure in the brake lines and was able to bring the vehicle to a stop. We thanked God and St. Joseph for their help – and then bled the brakes to carry on to Honduras. Dick Miller – my dad, is a member of the Immaculate Conception – Burlington KofC Council.

You see, with God, all things really are possible!

2014-2015 CHRISTMAS POSTER CONTEST

All students in Grades 1-4 in private or public schools or who are home schooled are eligible to submit entries. (Grades 5 & 6 may be included but only at the council level.)

Admittedly the theme "The True Meaning of Christmas" results in numerous scenes of the Holy Family in the stable. While this may compromise originality, a manger scene of high artistic quality will certainly catch the eye of many judges. Past winning entries have focused on the Baby Jesus, the Madonna and Child, or the Magi on their journey to Bethlehem. Others emphasized family gatherings, a country church on Christmas Eve, Peace on Earth or incorporated Christmas carols.

COUNCIL LEVEL

December 1st to December 15thSeveral councils recommended that the contest should begin after the First Sunday in Advent rather than before Thanksgiving. This later starting date corresponds with the season of Advent and makes the contest more timely!

Please use the official Identification Label found in the Wisconsin Book or on the KC web site. Be sure to fill in the COUNCIL and DISTRICT NUMBERS and the DIOCESE. Only FIRST PLACE WINNERS at the council level are eligible for Diocesan competition. Grand Knights/Contest Chairmen must record the winners' names and the number of entries at each grade level on the official poster contest report forms or on your own spread sheet. Send them to the Diocesan Program Coordinator by Dec. 30, 2014. This later deadline enables councils to display their posters at Christmas parties, or other venues if they wish.

DIOCESAN LEVEL

Diocesan Program Coordinators are obliged to send their 1st and 2nd place winners along with the DIOCESAN total number of council participants at each grade level to the State Poster Contest Coordinator by January 15, 2015. Diocesan awards should be mailed to the winners and the results should be sent to each District Deputy to be forwarded to participating councils.

STATE LEVEL

The 12 winning posters will be displayed at our 2054 State Convention. State awards and these posters will be mailed to each winner.

On behalf of our State Deputy, I wish to convey the following information and ask for your assistance in obtaining information from your assigned Councils.

Supreme Council Resolution No. 340 "SUBORDINATE UNIT OBLIGATION TO HAVE TERMS OF USE AGREEMENT AND CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION AGREEMENT IN PLACE WITH HOME CORPORATIONS" was approved at the 2014 Supreme Convention in Orlando, FL. The resolution stipulates that all Subordinate Units (Councils) using premises of Home Corporations for meetings and other functions must have a signed terms of use agreement and a charitable distribution agreement (collectively the "Model Agreements") in place with the Home Corporation. "Home Corporation" is a generic term for what are variously known as Permanent Homes, Home Associations, Council Halls, Columbus Clubs, KC Clubs, Knights of Columbus Clubs, etc.

In order to ensure that each of our Council which use Home Corporation facilities have access and are made aware of the new policy, it is requested that each District Deputy report which councils currently have an association with a Home Corporation.



The Dummies' Guide to Writing an Effective Resolution

When do you need a resolution? The simple, but not complete answer to that question is "anytime you want to propose a new policy or make a significant revision or change to an existing policy or By-Law statement." The resolution process is intended to enhance the fraternal character of our Order, to improve its governance and administration, and to serve its evangelical mission. It is not meant to be used to "send a message" to the State or Supreme Council or to challenge polices that have been affirmed at pervious State or Supreme Conventions. While the State Council welcomes resolutions to be submitted in good faith and in the spirit of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity, we strongly discourage Councils from submitting resolutions challenging well settled policies of the Knights of Columbus and that represent the sound judgment of the Supreme Council.

Resolutions to be considered at the Annual Meeting of the State Council may only be submitted by a <u>Subordinate Council</u>, the <u>State Deputy</u>, the <u>State Officers as a group</u>, and by <u>Standing State Committees</u>. (Resolutions submitted by Standing State Committees must be germane to the work of that committee.)

A resolution is composed of two parts. The first part consists of one or more paragraphs setting forth the relevant facts and the rationale for the action that the delegates are being asked to take. Each paragraph in the first part begins with the word "WHEREAS," each subsequent paragraph ends with "; and". The second part consists of one or more paragraphs describing with specificity an action to be taken. The first paragraph of the second part of the resolution begins with the words "NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED;" any subsequent paragraphs begin with the words "FURTHER RESOVLVED,".

Example of a submitted Resolution:

WHEREAS, in 1882, Venerable Michael McGivney, a parish priest of St. Mary's Parish in New Haven, Connecticut, envisioned the establishment of a fraternal society that would strengthen the faith of Catholic men and provide aid to their widows and families after their death; and

WHEREAS, on March 29, 1882, the Connecticut State Legislature officially approved and chartered this new organization called the Knights of Columbus, with its purpose of rendering pecuniary aid to its members and their families; rendering financial aid and assistance to the sick, disabled and needy; overcoming prejudice and bigotry against the Catholic population; and promoting religious, charitable, and social welfare activities; and

WHEREAS, Pope Benedict XVI, while celebrating Mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral during his Apostolic journey to the United States in April of 2008, called Venerable Michael McGivney an "exemplary American priest ... whose vision and zeal led to the establishment of the Knights of Columbus;"

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED; that we will pray for the beatification of our founder, the Venerable Michael McGivney, and encourage all Brother Knights and their families to become active members of the Father Michael McGivney Guild; and be it,

FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution be submitted for adoption by the Supreme Council.

Following these guidelines will enable the Resolutions Committee to perform its duties. Resolution submission is due to the State Advocate no later than February 1st, 2015 to be considered at the 114th State Convention in April 2015.
