

Membership Report - State Coordinator Jon Olson The Big picture of Membership

Thank you all for the effort of recruitment that we had last year. As the table on page two shows we as a state brought in over 1000 new members this past fraternal year. Well done and please thank everyone involved in this achievement. I send a more direct thank you to La Crosse Diocese, who actually surpassed their goal of recruitment. With members who have the willingness to ask fellow Catholic men if "they would like to know more of the benefits of being a Knight of Columbus", we can continue to do the good works that the Venerable Father Michael J. McGivney founded the order to do.

Now to turn our attention to the Whole picture of Membership. With our great feat of recruitment, we might have overlooked our other duties as members of the Knights of Columbus, and that is the welfare of the order and the members of our order. With the close to 1100 of new members in, we have had to say farewell to almost 600 to suspension/withdrawal and 840 members to death. That is right, over 1400 members gone from our council's rolls in one year. That difference is what burdens my heart and drives me to continue to preach for yet more new members and talk about retaining our current members. With this decay of our state's membership numbers, it means yet again we are forced to ask more of our current members to volunteer more time and put forth more effort into the current activities we do in our area to make it a better place and also prevent us to search out new activities to improve our communities. With our eyes now focused on two numbers (new members and suspended or withdrawn members), we further look around for other areas we could improve on and yet again we find another distressful number called deaths. As all of us are aware we cannot hold off death forever, nor would I ask the impossible from you. I only ask that we will need to look for way to encourage and promote younger members into our order to move the order's average to a younger age and to slow down this number. With the Theme of "ONE MEMBER, PER COUNCIL, PER MONTH" we can take on two of these numbers (new member recruitment and death), and empower other members take to heart our never ending battle to slow down or even halt our falling membership.

What do we do about members who do not pay their dues? It is a valid question and I do not discount it. I do want to ask a question though. Why did they stop paying? Is the reason they stopped is they did not feel part of the council? Did they not feel that they mattered to us beside a dues paying member only? (continued page 2)

(membership continued) These questions cannot just be answered by the FS when he is trying to collect dues. The whole council needs to investigate these questions and find where we, as a council, left them feeling this way and build a bridge back to the member and provide him a constructive outlet to give back to his and his family's community and contribute to our order's vision

With our eyes now open to the whole picture we can now start the new fraternal year with the bigger idea of making our order a group that is not only is looking for new members, but is concerned with the wellbeing of our current members and the torch bearer to our deceased members to continue on the constant fight to make our local areas a better section of the world than when we found it.


Being compassionate is what this world needs today, and is also what Jesus Christ is.

Structure: Weekly

That Man Is You! consists of 26 weeks of materials. We break the sessions into two 13-week semesters. All programs begin the fall semester in early September and finish in December. Then, we take off for Christmas break and begin again in mid January and run through April. The highlight of the second semester each year is a Lenten journey that the men absolutely love.

Currently, TMIY has been developed into three years of materials.

Growth: Rapidly Expanding

TMIY is active in 40 states and 400 parishes.

Cost of the program itself: Free

Once a parish gives us the green light that they are running the program, we give them the program for free. This includes a Core Team Manual, complete set of DVDs (weeks 1-26), Training DVD, Written Material CD, and Music Video DVD. We also provide assistance throughout the year as the TMIY Program Coordinator will help you and share with you our experiences. The host parish will receive database access to all their registered men and be able to send weekly email reminders. The parish does take on the cost to host the program which falls into the following categories.

By deciding to run the TMIY program a parish agrees to run the donation appeal as set out in the manual and on the donation training video. Successful donations appeals, which are necessary for us sustaining as a ministry, will also rely on the efforts and the attitude of the core team, e.g., by doing what they can to promote participation. One donation appeal in the Fall and one in the Spring is made to the men who attend. We provide a short 2 minute DVD to play for our appeal. Checks and cash are collected and sent in to Paradisus Dei.

Supreme has directed that all youth leaders, and those that supervise youth leaders, must scan and e-mail a copy of their diocesan certificate to youthleader@kofc.org The e-mail subject line should contain the council or circle number and the youth leader's name and membership number (e.g., Council 560, John Doe, #86775309). Each of our five diocese have adopted their own training program.

Brother Knights; at the recent District Deputy meeting the breakout sessions in regards to Ceremonials were very informational and successful. With the many new District Deputies, there were many questions that I know were answered. Information and ideas were shared, such as how to fill out a degree request and where this is located on the state web-site. Who is responsible for the 2nd and 3rd degrees (District Deputies) and what form needs to be completed for Supreme after the degrees.

State Deputy Ron Faust made it clear that all councils need to fill out the form that indicates when they hold First and Second Degrees. Some councils schedule degrees quarterly others schedule them every month. Your District Deputy should be holding or maybe already has held his District Meeting. This would be a great time for the councils to fill out the form. The completed form needs to get to, State Deputy Ron Faust, or State Membership Coordinator Jon Olson or myself. We in turn will see that we each get a copy. This is a requirement not only from State Deputy Faust, but from Supreme.

There were many other ceremonial items discussed at the breakout session that your District Deputy will share at his meeting.
