I asked that you send me a copy of each report if you have not already done so.

Clearly, our founders believed in the value of human life as the basis for all other human rights. Today, this opinion that life holds little value is so common that many people who are pro-life consider it very difficult or even impossible to change our culture and our government on their own, but with God all things are possible (Matthew 19:26).

Our drive to raise \$100,000.00 is coming up a bit short. As of June 19th we have collected \$97,012.41. I know of 2 more donations coming in that should be around \$1,500.00, which would leave us around \$1,500.00 short. The drive ends June 30th. Thank You to all who have donated.

We have again partnered with Team Wisconsin 2018, with the same goal of \$100,000/00. The goal can be achieved by \$3.00 per member over a 4 year period, or \$0.75 a member per year. This is a very easy goal for all Councils to meet. Hopefully all Councils will take part in this drive.

I have just returned from New Jersey where I had the great honor of leading Team Wisconsin into the opening ceremonies at the Prudential Center in Newark, NJ. There were around 70,000 people there for the opening. Wisconsin Special Olympics had 62 athletes participating in 8 different sports. My wife and I were able to watch completion in a number of sports and were able to cheer Wisconsin athletes on. A great time was had by all. We were able to meet many people from across the U.S. and all were grateful for the support that they receive from the Knights of Columbus. The Wisconsin KC's are the only state that Partners with the National Team. Some other states have asked for info as to what we do.

I am retiring as Coordinator as of June 30th and Bryce Lisowski will be taking over. His contact info will be in the new state directory. I will be helping Bryce for a time as he gets settled in. Please give Bryce the support you gave me. I have to say that it is hard to leave a position where all of you have been so friendly and helpful. I have made many new friends and will miss working with all of you.

The recycling program will continue as it has been going. Bryce will also be the contact for that. Remember that all inkjet and toner cartridges must be used only the 1st time. If it has been remanufactured it is not worth anything. If we send in too many remanufactured items they might charge us for freight. I would ask that you copy the tracking number that is on the shipping label and forward that info to us. A few shipments have been lost and with the tracking number we can contact you about what was in it and work out a price with the recycler.

Message from State Deputy Elect Ron Faust

The Wisconsin Way Seminarian Pilgrimage submitted by Jim Gorman

The Wisconsin Way Seminarian Pilgrimage was a feat undertaken by Fr. Andrew Kurz, Diocesan Chaplain of the Green Bay Diocese. This is the second hike and he requested the assistance of some of the local Knights of Columbus councils to provide food and lodging.

This pilgrimage consisted of 11 seminarians from the Green Bay Diocese, one from the St. Nazianz Orthodox Catholic Church & St. Francis de Sales Seminary in Milwaukee. The hike took place over 8 days starting at the Shrine at Champion - Our Lady of Good Help, site of the only approved Marian apparition in the U.S.A. and ending at Holy Hill Basilica near Hubertus. They used the Ice Age Trail and part of the Eisenbaum trails.



Two Councils, Council #11301, Bishop Salvator Schaefer, Campbellsport & Council #1964, Fr. Casper Rehrl, West Bend, provided food, refreshments and lodging for this group led by Fr. Kurz. This hike provided an opportunity to share lives with each other and several Boys Scouts.

They were greeted by members of the Knights of Columbus at St. Mathias Catholic Church, New Fane area and St. Mary's Immaculate Conception Church in West Bend, along with other priests. The Grand Knight from Campbellsport was Mike Chern - who organized his council and Scott Weinandt - Deputy Grand Knight John Flynn- Deputy Warden from the West Bend Council. Several other priests joined in for the food and camaraderie were Fr. Ed Kornath, pastor of Holy Trinity in Kewaskum, Fr. John Redetski, Pastor of St. Mary's and Fr. Tom Perrin - Associate at St. Mary's

Our Lady of Guadalupe Silver Rose Run One Life, One Rose

In 1960 Squires of the Knights of Columbus in Mexico, United States and Canada came up with the idea of honoring Mary with a rose. Mary used the rose as a sign of her appearance at Guadalupe. They started at London Ontario, Canada, and ended at the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Monterrey, Mexico, presenting Mary with a live rose. The following year, both a bronze rose and a silver rose were used. The decision was made to use a silver rose in the future. The silver rose is crafted from a real rose.

In the 1990's, the Knights made the Silver Rose an official program. In 2001, One Life, One Rose was added to the name of the program, recognizing Mary's role in fighting the Culture of Death. Three roses followed three routes that year from Canada through the United States to arrive at the Basilica in Monterrey on 12 December, the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

This is the first year that the Wisconsin State Council of the Knights of Columbus is participating in the run. There are now five roses following five routes and covering 53 provinces and states. Wisconsin is on Route 3. The Rose started in Manitoba on 27 April 2014 and entered Minnesota on 18 May 2014. We will receive the Rose on 8 June 2014 at the Mississippi River by La Crosse. We transfer the Rose to Illinois on 29 June 2014 at Beloit. From Illinois the Rose goes to Iowa on 20 July, Missouri on 10 August, Kentucky on 31 August, Tennessee on 21 September, Arkansas on 12 October and Texas on 2 November. On 12 December 2014, the five Silver Roses meet on the International Bridge to Mexico. Runners from the Squires carry the Roses to Monterrey and present them to Our Lady at the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

The route of the Rose through Wisconsin has nineteen prayer services. The days, times and locations are listed on the Table below. The locations are shown on the map. We tried to cover as much of the State as possible. If your council does not have a prayer service, check the map and organize a council/family outing to the nearest prayer service. Or a council could set up its own rose run such as Council 499 in Superior which will have a "Marathon for Mary" on 14 June. A silver ribbon per mile presents one silver rose to Mary. The prayer service is part of the Marathon.

Why are we doing this? Father McGivney probably loves the Knights doing such things as the Tootsie Rolls, working the food pantries and helping those in need. But I think that he finds it far more important to be in communication with Jesus. And at the foot of the cross, Jesus gave us Mary, his mother. To Jesus through Mary. We attach our love, our prayers and our petitions to the Rose, our gift to Mary. And why do we run? What greater way to bond to the Silver Rose than to give of ourselves.

Special thanks to all the Knights who have helped to put this Run together. If we call it our plan, we give God the opportunity to have a laugh. That's why we pray.

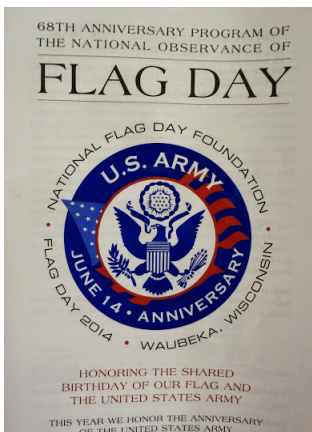



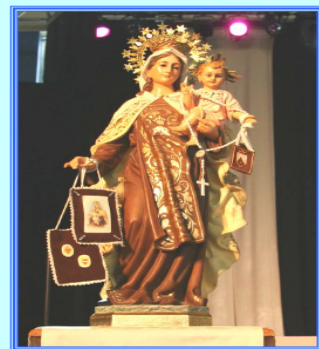
