



### CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

“Through thine intercession win for us the grace...” During October the Church recalls the many victories won for her by Our Lady of the Rosary. Whether they're epic struggles like the Battle of Lepanto or our own individual battles for personal holiness and right living Mary is the surest way to ensure our prayers find favor with Christ. Consider how she interceded for the bride and groom at Cana (Jn 2). But how is it that the Rosary in particular aids us?

Why not just say, “Mary, carry my prayer to Jesus.” There's something very special about the meditation on the mysteries that happens in the Rosary. Each one is a chance to place ourselves in the Gospel and become close co-workers with Christ. The closer we come to him by this insertion into the mysteries the more confident we can be that he *will call us friends and let us know what he is about* (cf Jn 15:15)... and, consequently, answer our prayers.

My Brother Knights:



## MARYLAND STATE SILVER ROSE PROGRAM



On Dec. 9, 1531, a vision of Mary, the mother of Jesus, appeared to a humble Mexican farmer and weaver named Juan Diego, who had recently converted to Catholicism. That morning, as he passed Tepeyac Hill outside Mexico City, he heard music and saw a glowing cloud and rainbow, according to St. Juan Diego's biography at Catholic.org. At the top the hill, a beautiful young woman dressed as an Aztec princess told Diego she was the Virgin Mary and asked him to tell the bishop to build a church on that site. The bishop, the story goes, suggested Diego ask the Lady for a sign to prove his claim. Three days later, Mary again appeared on Tepeyac Hill. She told Diego to pick the Castilian roses that had miraculously appeared and bring them to the Spanish-born bishop.

Diego gathered the roses into his cloak and brought them to the bishop. As he opened his cloak to show off the flowers, the image of Our Lady -- which lasts until this day -- appeared on the garment. The church was built, and over the next decade millions of Mexican natives were converted and baptized into the Catholic faith.

This month, as part of a 50-year tradition, the Knights of Columbus of Maryland are honoring Our Lady of Guadalupe, the Patroness of the Americas, through their Silver Rose program. Beginning May 20 in Ontario, a symbolic silver rose has been carried down through the United States, with daily prayer services along the way. It is headed to Monterrey, Mexico, where it will be received Dec. 12, the feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Special prayer services will be held throughout Maryland between November 3 and 23. Plan to attend.



### FIRST COLUMBUS DAY - OCTOBER 12, 1492

Do You Remember This Famous Poem?


### Fair Trade Craft Sale - Holiday Sign-Ups



### Culture of Life - A People of Life and for Life

The Knights of Columbus remains firmly committed to defending the right to life of every human being, from the moment of conception to natural death. Countless councils and individual Knights conduct projects aimed to build a culture of life in their individual communities. One of the most successful of the Order's initiatives in this area is the Ultrasound Initiative through which councils (both state and local) partner with the Supreme Council in provide sharing the cost of purchasing ultrasound machines for pregnancy resource centers. What we choose to do, or not do, about abortion, euthanasia, human cloning and embryonic research impacts lives for generations to come. Take action now and support a culture that values human life at all stages.

#### 1. Volunteer

Your valuable time can save precious lives. Contact a local pro-life pregnancy center to find out how you can

help women choose life and turn away from abortion. You can also support programs that work with women who have been physically and emotionally wounded by abortion.

#### 2. Educate

Share your knowledge with others who may not fully understand the value of all human life, or take it upon yourself to find out more, so you can be a more effective witness for life.

#### 3. Advocate

Work to change laws and touch hearts. Support your council's pro-life committee, and start a pro-life group in your parish if there isn't one already. Consult your diocese's pro-life office to find out issues of concern, and write or meet with your local and national elected officials to discuss legislation.

#### 4. Donate

Your personal donation, and funds from your council, could make a big difference in the shoestring budgets of local pro-life organizations. Locate the pregnancy center in your area and arrange a regular donation schedule that will help these groups provide pregnant women with counseling services, medical referrals and basic items for newborns.

#### 5. Pray

Prayer is the power that should support all of your pro-life activities. Pray for life personally and with your family. Each Knights of Columbus council should include prayers for life at its regular meetings and take part in the annual Day of the Unborn Child on the feast of the Annunciation.
