Chaplain's Message

Be Merciful: Comfort the Sorrowful and Visit the Imprisoned

Brother Knights:

As I am mentioned in my previous articles, the Church depends very much on organizations such as ours to be on the "front lines" of demonstrating and witnessing to the Catholic faith. This is especially true of the Works of Mercy. The Knights of Columbus can and must always demonstrate these both as individuals within the community and as a Catholic fraternal organization. Thus far, I have reflected on the first three Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy.

The fourth Spiritual Work of Mercy is to **comfort the sorrowful**. All of us have had moments of sorrow in our lives. When we experience that sorrow because of a tragedy, death, sickness or any other reason, we know how important it is to have others around us. We can relate to the comfort of having others assist us with their time, prayers, or other types of support. Within our fraternity, we Knights offer prayers for the sorrowful at every meeting. We endeavor to reach out and support the family members when a Brother Knight is ill or has passed away.

However, this work of mercy must go beyond Brother Knights and their families. How can we be part of outreach programs that may be available in our parishes or in the community? Can we from our own life experiences, be of assistance to others in similar situations by becoming a part of a support group? Sending a card, having a Mass said, lighting a votive candle for one's special intentions are but a few of the material and spiritual ways we can comfort the sorrowful. Who do we know is hurting? How can we "be there" for them and with them?

We must remember that it is an act of both mercy and love to help another person in any kind of sorrow, and to refrain from doing anything that would

unnecessarily cause another person more sorrow.

The fourth Corporal Work of Mercy is to visit the imprisoned. Most of us would think of this as a "no brainer"; but do we really understand this work of mercy in not just the strict sense, but also in the wide sense? Those in prison and many other persons and their families suffer hindrances or dangers to freedom. Helping them, visiting them or protecting them is an act of love and mercy. Of course, there are in many parishes and faith communities groups that minister to those who are incarcerated. Becoming involved in these programs allow us to perhaps evangelize others in the faith or just let them know that others care about them and their future—especially with regards to the faith. Communion Services by Eucharistic Ministers, Bible Studies, teaching of prayers and basic doctrines in discussion groups are but a few of the ways we can embrace this work of mercy.

In our diocese alone there are 8 county prisons, 6 State Prisons, and 1 Federal Prison. One can always check with the Chaplains of these respective prisons and ask how we or our families can pray for and support the inmates. If cards are allowed, they can be sent to the prisoners. Also, through the prison chaplains, Bibles and rosaries can be made available to the prisoner's as well. These works of mercy are wonderful opportunities to let others know of the companionship of our Lord and that of His mother—Mary, Star of the Sea.


