Half Time Report



Lisa and I wish you and your families a very Merry Christmas as we start moving into the second half of the Fraternal year and to thank each of you for all you are doing to promote and spread the word about the Knights in Wisconsin. We are truly blessed to be leading our councils into 2020. Membership growth is key not only to our success but the growth of our Catholic Faith in Wisconsin.

We have had a really good first half, membership growth is up from last year, Faith in Action programs are increasing, Wisconsin Knights are stronger now than we have been in years. Yet, we have a ways to go and we don't want to become complacent in our mission. Pride, Service and Responsibility have been key contributors to our success this year, but in order to have an even better second half each of us should take stock in what it means to be a Knight in our order, what it means to have a successful council, and how are we going to finish strong.

There are several key aspects I would like to share with you from our State Deputy meeting held in November. In the next several weeks your District Deputy will be holding his mid-year meeting. I am asking each District Deputy to evaluate each of his councils and report back to me by the end of December his findings. From that the state team will be contacting those councils who may need assistance not only in membership growth but in programs (Faith in Action) growth as well. Key points I am asking each District Deputy to look at are:

- Healthy councils run successful programs. District Deputies must assess and coach grand knights on how to use programs to drive council growth and success.
- Reinforce WHY we want healthy councils. Because healthy councils are ready and prepared to step into the breach. We step into the breach through Faith in Action.
- District deputies need to assess council health through Faith in Action by holding their grand knights accountable.
- Having a conversation with your pastor about our Faith in Action programs and which are right for the parish.
- Ensuring that each council is implementing Faith in Action programs
- Ensuring that each council understands and implements the Required Programs
- Ensure that each council makes it a priority to fill the Program Director position and that this person plays oversees the implementation of all council programs and manages the reporting of all program activities

Want to give them more information? Put 'Join Us' pamphlets (10537) out in your church. They have information about E-Membership and more information about Programs the Knights offer.


Almost all of us would agree the Knights of Columbus are a great group to join but if no one knows what we do or who are members, why would someone new join? Show them!

SAFE ENVIRONMENT

Worthy Sirs,

It is my great pleasure to thank you all for your tireless efforts towards working to become 100% compliant with the Safe Environment requirements for your councils. As of this writing (November 21st), we have 118 councils in the State that are 100% compliant. This is outstanding, as we have almost 39% of the councils in the State meeting these important requirements. This already exceeds where we ended the last 2 years at, where we only had roughly 30% (2017) and 35% (2018) compliant.

My goal as I stated in prior submissions was to be close to achieving 50% of the councils compliant before the end of the calendar year, and we are trending in the right direction...as every week we are picking up another 4-5 councils being fully compliant!

At the Winter DD meeting, I will be focusing on the next steps needed to achieve this goal along with the lofty expectation of 75% of our councils compliant by the State Convention. We will be discussing with your District Deputies the potential of conducting training sessions at the various Dioceses in the State in January and February to try and pick up an additional 10 councils in each Diocese--roughly another 16% at least! Please stay tuned to these upcoming dates if your council still has officers needing to fulfill this important training.

Also of note, 75% of the councils in the State that have completed and submitted their Form 365 and Form 185 with Supreme. When I originally sent communications regarding this back in October, we were just over 60%, so obviously the trend is that COMMUNICATING REGULARLY with councils that have outstanding requirements needed to be completed is working! We are already far exceeding where we ended the last 2 years with respect to these form submissions. My goal now, becomes a little bit loftier than prior expectations because you all are doing an outstanding job! I see no reason that we can't strive to be above 90% submission of these forms by the State Convention. Let's make it happen!

I thank you to all that have taken the necessary steps needed to submit these important forms...and I implore you if you are in the 25% who have not, to get this completed ASAP! If not, I will ask for you all to make this your New Year's Resolution!

My promise to you all is that I will continually communicate regularly with the councils still needing to complete these training requirements until we achieve these goals! All I ask of you is to communicate back with me if you are having any difficulties or questions in completing this, as I am here to help!

In the wise words of a Cable guy named Larry, 'Git er Done!'

Lastly, as we embark on the 2nd half of this Fraternal year, I wanted to once again extend a challenge to all Diocese in the State! The goal for membership this Fraternal year was to end the year net/net positive! As of this writing, Green Bay, Milwaukee and Superior have achieved this status! I see no reason why all 5 Diocese cannot accomplish this feat...a first for our state in my recent memory since being involved at a State/District level of the past 6 years.

Green Bay is neck and neck with Milwaukee, and I fully expect Green Bay to end the year this year as the top Diocese in the State. We plan to end this calendar year at close to 150 new members, which is on pace for meeting our yearly goal! This is due to the hard work of our council leaders, District Deputies, along with the RMCs who have tried to attend weekly since September the Church Drives going on in our Diocese.

We planned back in July the steps that were needed to achieve such a high standard by mapping out our entire calendar year's Church Drives and Degrees. By doing so, we are able to get the help that is needed to successfully recruit these some 150 men into our order.

At our December meeting we will be revisiting this calendar, and scheduling further Drives and Degrees.

It isn't that difficult for EVERY council to do this.

Quite simply, to meet our goal of 1250 members, it seems that we need to move heaven and earth at times.

Well...being a student of numbers, I like breaking things down to 'simplify' the action steps that are needed to achieve this goal...

With 305 councils in our State...if each council brought in 4 NEW Members we would be just short of this goal (but well within reach).

If we are averaging just 2 members per degree, this means that each council needs to hold a MINIMUM of 2 DEGREE EVENTS a year!

It doesn't seem impractical to think that you should be able to get 2 NEW MEN EVERY 6 MONTHS by conducting a proper church drive, or by recruiting at the various activities that your council does. You even have the support of RMCs to assist you with these Drives.

1250 is the goal for the State...but that isn't achieved if it isn't started at the council level, by coordinating your membership events and communicating them to your State Officers, District Deputies and RMCs so that they can assist.

In the words of Membership Director, 'by working together, we will achieve.'

Let's start 2020 off on the right foot and use December as a month to reflect and plan what is needed to achieve! We are all in this together!




