

Father's Day Renewal of Wedding Vows Program - June 19

The Knights of Columbus' Domestic Church initiative seeks to integrate our members and their families more fully into the sacramental and social life of the parish. Our parish-based events and programs offer encouragement to families, who are called be "domestic churches" — assemblies of believers that together participate in the work of God.

As a part of the Domestic Church initiative, each council should help plan a Renewal of Wedding Vows event. The renewal should take place on Father's Day - June 19, during or immediately following all Masses celebrated at the parish on that day.

This event will give couples the opportunity to bear witness to the Catholic understanding of marriage and the importance of marriage as the building block for strong families and parishes. Councils should have already begun planning for this Father's Day event. If your council is just beginning to plan, be sure to talk to your pastor and verify the parish schedule. Now is also the perfect time to invite all council members to attend with their families. You should also distribute flyers about the event at Masses and council meetings. Post the details on council and parish bulletin websites as well as on social media. Also, continue to plan how you wish to congratulate each couple, whether through hosting a brunch or supplying a wedding cake in honor of the ceremony.

Wisconsin Knights of Columbus Notes

Fr. John Hardon once wrote: “St. Thomas Aquinas believed that man is more than a composite of body and soul, that his is nothing less than elevated to a supernatural order which participates, as far as a creature can, in the very nature of God. Accordingly, **a person in the state of grace**, or divine friendship, possesses certain enduring powers, the infused virtues and gifts, that raise him to an orbit of existence as far above nature as heaven is above earth, and that give him abilities of thought and operation that are literally born, not of the will of flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.”

However, all bets are off when we fall to mortal sin, especially the sin of impurity that is now at epidemic proportions in our easy access Internet age. The great Confessor, St. John Vianney wrote: “He who lives in sin (mortal) takes up the habits and the appearance of the beasts. The beast, which has not reason, knows nothing but its appetites. So the man who makes himself like the beasts loses his reason, and lets himself be guided by the inclinations of his body. He takes his pleasure in good eating and drinking, and in enjoying the vanities of the world, which pass away like the wind. I pity the poor wretches who run after that wind; they gain very little, they give a great deal for very little profit -- they give their eternity for the miserable smoke of the world.” -St. John Vianney

In a past newsletter, I said: “Men are called to be St. Josephs; the spiritual leaders of their families. But, in order to do this, they must be ignited by the Holy Spirit; they must believe in and cooperate with the power of supernatural grace. But, if men are not seeking this power or, worse yet, are not even aware of such a power, they are lacking the only real power capable of making them effective spiritual leaders.”

These times we are living in are some of the most challenging in all of human history. At the recent National Prayer Breakfast, Cardinal Robert Sarah called these “portentous times.” He went on to say, “All manner of immorality is not only accepted and tolerated today in advanced societies, it is even promoted as a social good. The result is hostility to Christians and increasingly, religious persecution ... This is about defending ourselves, children and future generations from the demonic idolatry that says children do not need mothers and fathers. It denies human nature and wants to cut off an entire generation from God. The entire world looks to you, waiting and praying to see what America resolves on the present unprecedented challenges the world faces today. Such is your influence and responsibility.”

My brother Knights, let’s lead the way in this challenge, but let’s do it as soldiers of Christ who are “lit up” in God’s supernatural power! God needs you, men, but He needs you “lit up” in His mighty power. Without that power, we are prone to, as St. John Vianney says, “Behave like the beasts” ... prone to compromise with the world.

I am **absolutely convinced** that admittance back to the Divine Life – that “state of grace” - is a movement of monthly Holy Hours, with Confession. In the coming year, we will be making efforts to have these monthly evenings of Adoration and Confession available at many parishes. Let’s accept the challenge, and move out in God’s supernatural power! Let’s allow God to light up the nearly two million Knights of Columbus in this great country of ours!

Jesus, Mary and Joseph, pray for us!

And now, on to the rest of our list of “First Things” begun two months ago.

June 19: Special Father’s Day Corporate Communion and Affirmation of Wedding Vows. This also comes to us directly from our Supreme Knight, Carl Anderson. Again, here is his message to all of us:

Councils will be asked to host corporate communions on Father’s Day (June 19, 2016) — inviting members and their families to attend Sunday Mass together — and request that the celebrant officiate at a **Father’s Day Affirmation of Wedding Vows**. Councils may also consider hosting a special reception after Mass to further celebrate the commitment of married couples in their parish.

My brothers, we are very close in Wisconsin to achieving what is called “Circle of Honor.” The best analogy I have heard is that this is, for a State, like a council achieving Star Council. In keeping with our focus of Building the Domestic Church, on Father’s Day, invite the young fathers in your parish to join your council. We need them; and even though they do not know it yet, you can confidently tell them that they need us, too. And in the process you will do your bit toward our State achieving Circle of Honor for the first time in decades!

October: Holy Hour with Benediction and Consecration. This was already in the works in Wisconsin when this message came to us from Supreme Knight Carl Anderson March 9th.

As we continue to implement the *Building the Domestic Church While Strengthening Our Parish* initiative, I am writing to ask every State Council to expand our Holy Family Prayer Program by hosting a *diocesan-wide “Holy Family Celebration” one Saturday in October*.

These celebrations should be based on the existing, rosary-based Holy Family Prayer Program (#5050) already in use by councils, but should also be expanded to include the Consecration to the Holy Family (#10371) and a period of adoration and solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. The program can also be supplemented in other ways, such as by inviting a Knights of Columbus family — perhaps your jurisdiction’s Family of the Year — to give a witness talk. These celebrations could be held in a cathedral, major church or other suitable venue to facilitate the greatest participation possible, both by brother Knights and their families, and by the broader Catholic community.

YOUR PERSONAL FIRST THING: For your personal first thing you will need to set the date. Consider this my personal invitation to you to join me, if you haven’t already done so, as an insurance member of our order. What has this got to do with “first things?” Consider this.

An insight came to me at the Madison Diocese “Into the Breach” event, as I prayed before the Blessed Sacrament. That is, a lot of Catholic men are really busy and might avoid making another commitment, such as joining the ranks of The Knights of Columbus. For that reason, it is very good to share with them that they can make a positive difference without spending any time. How, you may ask? Simple; just become a Knight and meet with their Field Agent. They can help build a “Civilization of Love” by making sure the money they spend to protect their family is used only for good. In this battle in which we find ourselves, it is very good that we have a wholesome alternative to offer. They do not have to be subjected to having their own money used to undermine virtue, and damage their family members. Praise God that as Knights we have a better option!

But how do we do this with any integrity if we do not believe it ourselves? And how can we say we believe it and still not be an insurance member? My brothers, I implore you, use every weapon at your disposal in this great battle in which we find ourselves. We Knights can make the difference and turn the tide for the cause of all that is good and holy in Holy Mother Church. Not only is it the right thing to do, it can even spell the difference between your council achieving or not achieving the Star Council Award! And that can mean hundreds of extra dollars from the Supreme Council to help with your charitable works.

Let us all help each other to finish the race that is this fraternal year.

Brother Knights,

It was such a tremendous experience to see and talk with so many of you at the State Convention; what enthusiasm and dedication I saw amongst all the delegates, officers, guests and family there. As we race toward the conclusion of our 2015-16 fraternal year, let's take that dedication and enthusiasm and use it to the utmost for our final programming of the year! As of now, our focus should be in the following areas: 1) Star Council – Membership, Columbian Award; 2) Complete Council Every Council should be striving to attain Star Council status. To do that, you need, first of all, to have your Form 365 and Fraternal Surveys already in. Secondly, you need to earn the Fr. McGivney and Founder's Awards by meeting your membership and insurance member quotas for the year and being net/net+ for the year. Work with your pastors to get another Church Drive or 2 in. Get your 1st Degrees set up. Work with your General and Field Agents to get those insurance members in; try to get new members to sign up for the New Member Annuity. Finally, get your Columbian Award form in soon! Every Council that is at all active should be able to earn that award! Work with your District Deputies, officers and directors to get that form filled in. You do a lot of good work during the year – earn your Council and Brother Knights the credit they deserve. Also, by not waiting to the last minute to get it in, Supreme may be able to review it and if something is missing or in error, corrections can be made and a revised form sent in by midnight June 30, so you don't miss out on the award you've earned! We should be getting at least 50-60 Councils earning Star (out of some 295 in the state); there's a lot of room for improvement there! As to Complete Council, if you have all your forms in, as you should; and get that Columbian form in, you've already made the first step. If you're on track for Membership, including Degrees and Church Drives, your only concern is a Benefits Night. For Council, the big issue is a History Book. If you failed to submit one this year and you've got your other areas covered, contact me and an accommodation may be arranged. Other than that, if you've attended your Diocesan meeting and the Convention as you should, and held a Corporate Communion, you're OK. Youth, Community and Culture of Life all have a range of choices to meet the criteria, which shouldn't be hard to do! So, Grand Knights, Financial Secretaries, District Deputies, let's work together, get these programs finished, use the checklists you've been provided. Forward that information to your Diocesan Program Coordinators. If you need further assistance, contact me. Let's work together to get 4 or 5 times the 18 Councils who qualified for the award last year! You deserve it and I know we can do it. With the impending election of new officers and appointment of new directors, program chairmen, etc., it's time to begin planning your 2016-17 fraternal year programming! Start now to use those fraternal planners. Evaluate/review your programs from this past year. Working with your pastor, determine your parish's/cluster's needs and what you can do to help. Take note of the Supreme Knight's call to align our programs more closely with them, especially in terms of things like youth, faith formation, CUL, etc. Take also into account, not only your charitable giving/service programming, but also the call from Supreme to use all of our programs as vehicles for spreading the news of what we do and engaging parishioners/parents/prospects in our activities to help bring more members into the Order! Be sure to add at least 1 or 2 new programs into your agenda for the new fraternal year! Have a great Memorial Day weekend and be sure to honor those fallen vets who gave their all for our freedom!



Let's finish out the last quarter of the 2015-16 Fraternal year on a strong note. With your help, I know we will!





Jubilee Year of Mercy



- Go to Confession regularly — monthly or even weekly.
- Read and meditate on the Sacred Scriptures, especially the Gospel of Luke.
- Perform one or more works of mercy every day.
- **Go on a pilgrimage.**
- Share the Good News of God's mercy through your words and good deeds.
- Celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday in your parish, receiving Communion in the state of grace in order to receive the "clean slate grace."
- Place the Divine Mercy Image in a prominent place in your home and venerate it daily.
- Offer a novena of chaplets for the intentions Jesus gave St. Faustina in the nine days preceding Divine Mercy Sunday.
- Pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy daily, imploring mercy "on us, and on the whole world."
- Make the Stations of the Cross regularly, especially at 3 p.m., the Hour of Great Mercy.


Join: The Father Michael J. McGivney Guild



One Life, One Rose

Our Lady of Guadalupe Silver Rose Run



This is the 56th year of the program which began in 1960 as a project of the Columbian Squires of North America to honor the Blessed Virgin under her title of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas. The First Rose was a natural rose. The program has continued as a project of Columbian Squires circles, councils and Fourth Degree assemblies working in unison to promote devotion to Our Lady of Guadalupe. In the 1990s Supreme Knight decided to make the Silver Rose a Supreme Council program.

The first effort consisted of one route carrying a Silver Rose from London, Ontario through the central U.S. to Texas for transfer to Mexico. Soon there were three Silver Rose routes, one mimicking the original route; another starting in Manitoba and moving to British Columbia, then down to the Pacific Coast before turning east into Arizona and on to Texas; and a third route starting in New York, then down the eastern seaboard, then to several southern states to Texas.

In 2001 the Supreme Knight expanded the program by establishing the "Running of the Rose" from the 119th Annual Meeting of the Supreme Council in Toronto. The "Running of the Rose" honors not only Our Lady of Guadalupe and the unity of the Order, but reaffirms the Order's dedication to the sanctity of human life. It is to the Blessed Mother that we turn in prayer as we work to end the Culture of Death that grips our society. As we think in terms of "One Life, One Rose," it is most appropriate that we turn to Our Lady of Guadalupe who made known her will through Juan Diego and the miracle of the roses."

This year there are six Silver Rose routes. Routes 1 thru 5 started on 6 March. Route 6 starts on 10 April. They all end on 12 December, the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Not all of the Roses go to the Basilica in Monterrey, Mexico.

This is the third year that the Wisconsin Knights are part of the program. We are again part of Route 3 as follows:

Because the family is the subject of the New Evangelization, we want to share our faith with other families.

The new evangelization depends largely on the domestic church. In our time, as in times past, the eclipse of God, the spread of ideologies contrary to the family and the degradation of sexual ethics are connected. And just as the eclipse of God and the crisis of the family are linked, so the New Evangelization is inseparable from the Christian family. The family is indeed the way of the Church because it is the “human space” of our encounter with Christ. Spouses “not only receive the love of Christ and become a saved community, but they are also called upon to communicate Christ’s love to their brethren, thus becoming a saving community.” The family founded on the sacrament of marriage is a particular realization of the Church, saved and saving, evangelized and evangelizing community. Just like the Church, it is called to welcome, radiate and show the world the love and presence of Christ. The reception and transmission of divine love are realized in the mutual commitment of the spouses, in generous and responsible procreation, in the care and education of children, work and social relationships, with attention to the needy, in participation in church activities, in commitment to civil society. The Christian Family to the extent it succeeds in living love as communion and service as a reciprocal gift open to all, as a journey of permanent conversion supported by the grace of God, reflects the splendor of Christ in the world and the beauty of the divine Trinity.




